

Building Stones

The museum's new exhibit titled "From Local Quarries to Buildings Across America" had its official opening on June 12. Three stone quarrying businesses are featured in the exhibit: Pfeiffer Stone Company, Wolford's three companies, and McBride Stone Company. Large panels of photographs show stories of each of the family businesses. Samples of their marble, limestone and sandstone in raw state and in polished form are displayed.

Glass cases holding each company's stones, and photographs of buildings in which the stones appear, are showcased. Of particular note is the beautiful dark red marble from Wolford's Cartney quarry named Red Ark Fossil. It was used to cover Abraham Lincoln's tomb in Springfield, Illinois.

The Pfeiffer Stone Company was earliest of the three companies. It began operating the Batesville, Arkansas, quarry in 1903. Stone from it was used in building the Arkansas State Capitol and in buildings throughout Arkansas and Missouri.

The Wolford Stone Company is featured in the exhibit, but was also the focus of a well-attended program titled "What do the White House, the Lincoln Memorial and Batesville Have in Common?" presented by Rene Jordan. The Answer? Wolford Marble.

The Oran McBride Stone Company has been providing stone for structures across the United States and Canada since 1948. More quarries were purchased. Currently, they operate 10 sandstone, 9 limestone, and 3 marble quarries. Their main headquarters are in Bethesda, just west of Batesville.

In one corner of the exhibit, slabs of pink marble, Batesville Gray marble, and White Limestone stand upright showing marks from a quarry drill, a wire saw, channel machines, and a Myers quarry saw. A pneumatic drill stands with them.

This exhibit was created by Twyla Gill Wright, Kay Wolford Longenbach, and Diane McBride Harbin, with help from other family members.

Finding the Way to Our Museum

Isn't our new sign at the corner of Vine Street and St. Louis fine? It clearly shows visitors where to turn to find us easily. For years visitors, both local and those from out of town, have voiced their frustration at not being able to find the museum.

When John Dews of Citizens Bank offered to fund a sign for us, we set to work and found the process a bit long and complicated. We persevered and navigated the winding path through the Planning and Zoning Commission, found that restrictions prevented placing signs in the historic residential district, then looked for an existing sign pole and found just the right one in the commercial zone.

Terry Swaim gave us permission to use his empty sign pole on the corner of Vine Street, and we applied for a City Permit that allowed us to erect an off-site sign. Once we gained that, we asked Mark Rorie to design the sign, and with that in hand, plus making a map showing the exact location of the pole, we went through the Arkansas Highway Beautification Department for state permission to put up the off-site sign. They did an onsite visit and at last gave us an official permit. Quickly, we took that and our design to Dodd Signs for the sign installation

Tom Dodd refurbished the pole and up went the sign. Hooray!



Curator's Column

So far this year, we have received 75 collections of items from donors. Over the past 13 years we have gathered, processed, preserved, and made accessible to the public over 26,000 items. This does not include hundreds of photograph negatives and other smaller collections waiting to be accessioned. The breakdown is: 10,300 documents, 11, 450 photographs, 1,551 books in the library (not including hundreds of county historical society journals on the shelves), and 2,716 artifacts. We are proud to now have 16 volunteers who regularly work these collections!

Just a few of these collections that have come in during the last few months are: **Craig Ogilvie** — The Ozarks Mountaineer magazines 1998-2010

Diane Carter — World War II Army papers and a watch fog belonging to William K. Grice.

Sandra Saylers Cox — History and Genealogy of the Thomas Todd Tunstall family

Dr. Bob Slaughter — Many medical instruments, medicine bottles and other items

Diane Arnold — 5 medical journals kept by Dr. C.A. Churchill of Batesville

Polly Livingston — Many newspaper articles and family photographs. She also allowed us to make an oral history recording of her life.

Revs. Bob and Kay Burton — created a man's black top hat from felted beaver and rabbit fur for the museum to match the 1840s era.

Richard Dahlquist — Soft drink bottles that were bottled in Batesville, a stoneware bowl with the "Crouch" name, items from Mack-Farm Dairy, a sewing machine used in the Batesville Shoe Company, plus many other artifacts.

An Old Fashioned Family Christmas!



Daycamp

Old Independence Regional Museum held its 4th Annual Day Camp in June. Through games, crafts, and living history, 3rd-6th graders learned about the Civil War in our region. Each morning began with a story or living history presentation featuring a local historical figure. Some of these historical characters included: Clinton Earls, a free African American from Independence County, W.E. Bevens, a Confederate soldier from Jackson County, William Monks, a Union soldier from Fulton County, Emily Weaver, a Batesville resident who was convicted of spying, Fanny Hill, a college student, and Violet Lewis, an enslaved African American who ran a confectionary shop. In addition, campers learned military drills, made signal flags, learned Morse code, sewed haversacks, pieced freedom quilts, made hand fans, and many other crafts to help reinforce the things they learned.


Plans have already begun for the Museum's 5th Annual Day Camp in July 2012. Native Americans will be the focus!

Grant Awarded & Rain Leaks Fixed!

We were thrilled to receive a \$2,500 operating grant for small museums from the Arkansas Humanities Council. This was in response to our request for monies to repair interior damage from seasons of roof leaks.

In July M & A Jones and Jerry Richardson Roofing inspected the roof and then started the repair. Once it was fixed, and a subsequent rain proved the leaks had been fixed, M & A Jones' workmen stripped and filled the damaged dry wall surface in the library and in the curator's and educator's offices.

In August they repainted the north wall, plus repaired the wall in the women's restroom. They also did extensive repair to the damage on the inner wall at the side door. We are so pleased!
